## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2016

### A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This Summary of significant accounting policies is presented to assist in the understanding of the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of management, which is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

### 1. Business activity

UNITED WAY OF DODGE CITY, INC. (the "Organization") is a not for profit corporation which holds membership with the United Way of America. The Organization is dedicated to promoting public financial and volunteer support, in partnership with its member agencies to improve the quality of life and the standard of living for those in the Dodge City area. The Organization's allocation committee approves and allocates grants to twenty local member organizations. The Organization is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3).

#### 2. Basis of presentation

Financial Statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets. In addition, the Organization is required to present a statement of cash flows.

### 3. Net assets

Net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted net assets – Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily restricted net assets - Net assets are subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by the actions of the United Way of Dodge City, Inc. and/or the passage of time.

### 4. Promises to give

Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenues or gains in the period received and as assets, decreases of liabilities, or expenses depending on the form of the benefits received. Conditional promises to give are recognized only when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met and the promises become unconditional.

The Organization's management considers all promises to give shown on the financial statements to be collectable and an allowance for uncollectable pledges not to be necessary. If the amounts become uncollectible, they will be charged to operations when that determination is made. All promises to give at year-end are due in less than one year.

### 5. Property and equipment

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of the donation. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations, regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Organization reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time.

All acquisitions of property and equipment and all expenditures for repairs, maintenance, renewals, and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Property and equipment consists of office furniture and is carried at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over lives of three to ten years.

#### 6. Investments

The Organization has adopted SFAS No. 124, Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

#### 7. Designation of net assets

The Organization's board of directors currently has designated a portion of unrestricted net assets as a reserve fund in case of a community disaster. The funds are managed by the Community Foundation of Southwest Kansas.

#### 8. Restricted and unrestricted revenue and support

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Organization that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as net assets released from restrictions.

#### 9. Donated services

Donated services are recognized as contributions in accordance with SFAS No. 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made, if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization.

## A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES-continued

### 10. Functional allocation of expenses

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services based on an estimate of approximate time spent on each. Management and general expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the Organization.

#### Income taxes

United Way of Dodge City, Inc. is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In addition it qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2).

#### 12. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### 13. Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

### 14. Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at unpaid balances. The Organization uses the direct write-off method for recognizing uncollectible accounts. The Organization's management considers all accounts receivable shown on the financial statements to be collectible and an allowance for uncollectible accounts not to be necessary.

### B. COMMUNITY FOUNDATION MANAGED ASSETS

In a prior year United Way transferred its Community Emergency Fund monies to the Community Foundation of Southwest Kansas for investment. The Community Emergency Fund was established to insure that the community's social service providers would be able to meet community needs should any hardship occur, including loss of a major employer or a devastating act of God in the form of fire or storm such as a tornado or flood. Upon written request to the Foundation, United Way may withdraw earnings and/or principal to be used for the purpose stated above.

Investments in the Community Foundation are stated at fair value at year-end and consist primarily of equity mutual funds and fixed income mutual funds as follows.

Investment expenses for the year ended December 31, 2016 consisted of custodial fees of \$ 619.

### C. TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

The temporarily restricted net assets of \$ 257,624 at December 31, 2016 are to be used to pay agency allocations in the subsequent year.

#### D. CONCETRATIONS

Promises to give include amounts from employees of two corporate donors which comprise 73.42% of the balance at December 31, 2016. Should these sources not be able to meet their obligations, the Organization would have to arrange another source of funding or greatly reduce its allocations to agencies.
